CONVERSATIONS











NOTES FOR LEADERS

This resource is designed to provide a safe space for talking about the CofE Living in Love and Faith process and the proposed prayers of Love and Faith.

Feel free to adapt it to suit your group, but the following guidance may be useful:

- Ideally the discussion is best done in small groups of up to 12 people.
- The person leading the discussion needs to act as an impartial facilitator in order to enable people to speak honestly.
- The suggested process deliberately starts in a very structured way in order to create a safe space.
- Set a time limit and advertise this in advance. 90 minutes with a 10-minute break in the middle should suffice.
- In preparation for the session, ask people to read the proposed prayers and the summary of the current state of play (see Resource 1). They could also watch the short video:

Introduction

- Begin by welcoming everyone, and, if they don't know each other, going round the group asking everyone to say their name and where they live. If people already know each other, a nice ice-breaker is to ask people where they grew up.
- Explain that the purpose of the meeting is to hear different viewpoints and to understand where the members of the group are in relation to the proposals. We want everyone to have an opportunity to speak, but no-one will be forced to do so.
- Pray "Heavenly Father, you have called us in the Body of your Son Jesus Christ to continue his work of reconciliation and reveal you to the world: forgive us the sins which tear us apart; give us the courage to overcome our fears and to seek that unity which is your gift and your will; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen." - Common Worship: Collect for The Unity of the Church.
- Slowly read the Commitments from the LLF Course out loud (Resource
 2). You may want to ask each person to read one going round the group.
- Introduce the Pastoral Principles. Lay print outs on the floor of, what is known in the Pastoral Principles course as, the 6 pervading evils. Read each one out. (Resource 3)
- Ask group members to speak out the 'evil' which most resonates for them in relation to LLF issues. E.g Fear
- Invite people to say why they chose a particular word starting with the most common.
- Ask "How might being more aware of these pervading evils help us to have good relations in the Church?"

The Prayers

- Now turn to the Prayers of Love and Faith. Explain that the prayers cannot be used until Pastoral Guidance is issued.
- Ask people: What one comment would you like to make? For example, a prayer you particularly liked / disliked. What you feel is missing?
- You might like to ask 'What one word expresses your feelings as you read the Prayers of Love and Faith?' It may be worth offering example feeling words: thankful, concerned, angry, weary, relieved, confused, frustrated, excited, dismayed, joyful...
- Now invite one or two people with 'positive' feeling words to say something about why they have chosen the words they have.
- Then invite one or two people with 'negative' words to say something about the words they have chosen.

10 minute break

Where are we now?

- Have a bean bag or something similar pass this around the group asking each person (who wishes to) to speak for up to a minute about the questions 'What is the pressing issue for us as a church now? What do we need to attend to?'
- If there is time, pass the bean bag around again and this time let people respond (briefly) to what they have heard.
- Now allow time now for more general discussion, but also allow time for closing prayers and to finish on time.
- Ask the group to agree one sentence about your next steps (even if it is that you cannot agree!)

Conclusion

It is good to end the discussion with prayer. There are some suggested prayers and readings included in **Resource 4**.

Resource 1 Background

How do questions about identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage fit within the bigger picture of the good news of Jesus Christ? What does it mean to live in love and faith together as a Church?

Since 2017, the Church of England has been journeying together exploring some of these questions by means of a suite of Living in Love and Faith resources that were published in November 2020. The bishops of the Church of England invited church communities from across the country to use the resources to learn together, to listen to one another and to God. Everyone who took part was encouraged to share their insights, stories and reflections in order to contribute to the bishops' discernment about matters of identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage.

The house of bishops met during the autumn of 2022 and they have now offered some draft prayers commended for use in churches. You can find these here Use of the prayers will be a matter of conscience for each member of the clergy. At the same time the bishops issued an apology to members of the LGBTIQ+ community for the lack of welcome many had experienced. They also reaffirmed the traditional understanding of marriage as being between a man and a woman. The bishops response to the LLF process can be found here.

The proposals from the bishops were considered, debated and voted for, with one amendment, at the General Synod in Feb 2023. The amendment was to ensure that the final version of the Prayers of Love and Faith should not be contrary to or indicative of a departure from the doctrine of the Church of England.'

Resource 2 The Commitments

In our meeting together we commit to:

- holding each other before God in prayer;
- praying for the presence and guidance of the Holy Spirit in all our conversations;
- learning together from Scripture and from each other;
- enabling everyone to speak;
- making space for those whose voices have not yet been heard to contribute – but without putting people on the spot if they don't wish to speak;
- avoiding interrupting each other, instead acknowledging what others say before moving on to have our say;
- keeping confidential anything personal that is shared;
- taking care about how we speak about others who are not in the room;
- looking out for and being sensitive to people's feelings;
- giving each other time to reflect before sharing with others;
- taking time out as a group from time to time, offering one another an opportunity to say if there is anything in the discussion they have found difficult but haven't been able to express;
- learning together how we can live more fully in the way of Christ
