### Opposite things can be 'true' at the same time

RE is a vital subject in helping pupils to learn how to disagree agreeably.

Writing about the British Empire, author Sathnam Sanghera says children should be allowed to form their own opinions. He asserts that 'opposite things can be true at the same time about people and history.' He counsels against the way so many current debates turn into a form of 'football politics', where you have to support your side and hate the opposition.

Talking about the current Israel-Gaza conflict, Jonathan Freedland says: this is not a football match. We must avoid seeing these issues as a 'binary contest in which you can root for only one team, and where any losses suffered by your opponent - your enemy - feel like a win.' So, when we are constructing learning opportunities about religious and non-religious worldviews, we need to help our pupils to see the complexity and the 'messiness' of the world they are growing up in. The concepts we are teaching them about need to be understood in terms of nuance and ambiguity. This makes RE exciting to teach, but it can also make it a tricky subject to cover. This is because so much of the subjectmatter is contested knowledge, and therefore debateable, unlike many other subjects where facts can just be taught as facts! Good luck and enjoy!
